It's been nearly 25 years since Schools of Choice started in Michigan. School choice created new opportunities for parents to choose either a public or charter school for their children in or outside their neighborhood based on distance, academic achievement of students in the district, class sizes, safety, access to sports and extracurricular activities, access to parents' workplace, etc.

Today, nearly one-third of students in Michigan no longer attend their neighborhood public school.
