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**A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT**



There seems to be more spring in Spring this year because vaccinations are here, with the promise of hugs from family and friends. I've had a few in the last month and it seems like we are slowly getting back to normal...almost. We will continue to take some precautions even as we dare to enjoy some outings that were not possible a year ago.

The most important item on the League's agenda today is supporting the Michigan Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MICRC). The commission will be holding a meeting in Lansing on Thursday, May 27. LWVMI has requested that members of our local League help with logistics during the meeting, beginning at 3:30 pm and ending at 9:30 pm.; we are scheduling for 2-hour shifts beginning at 3:30. If you are interested and vaccinated we would love to have your help! Volunteers will wear masks and ask attendees to wear masks. Every attempt will be made to respect social distancing but this is a public meeting, so there are no guarantees that everyone will be complying. The meeting will also be on Zoom, so there is really no way of predicting who will show up in person or virtually. We are monitoring the hearings that occur before ours to be ready for any event. MICRC is charged with mapping the Michigan house and senate districts as well as our congressional district. The newly formed commission must take into account communities of interest. The League supported the constitutional amendment to create the commission and it continues to support them as they do their duty. The maps will determine how representatives are chosen for the next decade. Important stuff!

Equally important is the attempt to pass a number of [laws](#) which, if enacted, would suppress the vote. The League is on this, particularly Lansing's own Judy Karandjeff. You are encouraged to tell your Michigan legislators how you feel about these bills, but they will likely be passed and vetoed. The most serious threat is an attempt to get around the veto through a petition [drive](#). I'm confident that LWVMI is doing all it can in this area and will share information with us in a timely way. We will update through The Voter, Constant Contact emails and the occasional email from me.

Be sure to read the entire newsletter to hear about coming events, especially you gardeners! After planting native specimens in a Habitat for Humanity home, our environment group is sponsoring a webinar on why it's important. All three of our advocacy groups have kept us informed in the last several months. Our members just don a mask and make things happen.

Clearly, it's necessary to stay alert and stay involved. While we are doing that, we can also have a little fun enjoying the company of people who share a deep love of democratic values. We'll do it
